Dear Ms Ladolcetta:

On behalf of the domestic violence victims served by Women In Distress of Broward County, Inc., thank you for your continued support of our programs and services. We hope you will consider our request for \$2,000 to help offset the costs associated with assisting Hallandale Beach residents in need.

Women In Distress (WID) is the *only* nationally accredited, state-certified, comprehensive domestic violence program in Broward County. Established in 1974, our mission is to provide victims of domestic violence with safe shelter, crisis intervention and resources, and to educate the community in order to Stop Abuse For Everyone (SAFE) through Intervention, Education and Advocacy.

With a budget of more than \$4 million, Women In Distress provides 24-hour crisis intervention services through our hotline and shelter facilities, counseling for victims of domestic violence and their children at various locations throughout Broward County, educational sessions and professional trainings on domestic violence and related topics, and supportive services including provision of food, clothing and household items.

Women In Distress has partnered with the Hallandale Weed and Seed program to increase awareness of the prevalence of domestic violence, provide education on the signs of abuse and resources available for assistance, and mobilize the residents to join forces to stop domestic violence. Hallandale Beach will benefit as a result of the increase in awareness of community prevention strategies and open declarations of intolerance; the increase in identification of domestic violence will enable victims to seek early intervention; and a change in the perceptions of domestic violence.

According to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement there were a total of 286 domestic violence offenses reported to the Hallandale Police Department in 2006. 282 were reported as assaults and another 4 were forcible rapes. These numbers have tripled from the domestic violence offenses reported in 2005.



Among the services offered to Hallandale Beach residents are emergency shelter, individual/ group counseling, case management, information and referrals, and/or respite care. Last fiscal year, WID received 80 calls on our 24-hour crisis line from Hallandale Beach residents in need. Our hotline is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week for those in crisis or in need of information and referral services. At the time of each call, Women In Distress staff and trained volunteers offer compassion and understanding plus guidance in breaking free via police and judicial intervention.


Additionally, last fiscal year, 8 Hallandale Beach residents were sheltered (5 were children), and 25 Hallandale Beach residents received outreach services including counseling, service management, and/or respite care. Through our emergency shelter, victims of domestic violence and their children are provided a safe environment and supportive services to help them build and sustain independence and achieve a violence-free life. For many women, leaving the home is the first major step in breaking the cycle of abuse.

Once again, we thank you for your ongoing support of our mission. Women In Distress hopes the City of Hallandale Beach will join us in making Hallandale Beach SAFE (Stopping Abuse For Everyone.) In last year's Annual Report Women In Distress of Broward County, Inc. (WID) announced two long-term goals the board and staff were committed to achieving in the next 5 years and I'm proud to say we made great strides in moving these Initiatives forward in 2007.

First, the Agency committed to expanding services through more emergency beds for victims of domestic violence. A capital expansion committee was formed of community leaders and board members and they remained busy evaluating resources and options to grow Women In Distress' capacity to serve more victims.

Second, Women In Distress committed to increasing social change activities through community messaging and educational and awareness activities. The department of social change was established in 2007 and the results were astounding. The number of individuals receiving school based programming, community education and professional training grew by 60%. Additionally, the department forged new partnerships for domestic violence prevention and awareness work. As expected, these activities resulted in a 10% increase in Women In Distress services.



## Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI)

Women In Distress is fully committed to providing quality services by addressing efficiency, effectiveness and stakeholder satisfaction to enhance performance at all levels. To ensure compliance with this standard of care, we participate in an organization wide Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) program. CQI has become an engrained process for continually enhancing performance at all levels. Some of the highlights and accomplishments of 2007 were as follows

- 100% of advocacy participants reported they were satisfied with WID's services.
- 98% of former shelter residents contacted reported they were safe.
- 100% of mothers were satisfied with children's services.
- 99% were satisfied with WID's professional trainings.
- 99.5% of It's Not Okay attendees exceeded the established benchmark on their post-tests.

## OUR HISTORY

Edee Greene and a group of concerned citizens founded Women In Distress of Broward County, Inc. (WID) in July, 1974. WID began as Broward County's first refuge for homeless women in a modest four-bedroom home on Sistrunk Boulevard.


After enduring a brutal beating at the hands of her spouse, a young Broward mother sought sanctuary at WID. At the time, WID was not licensed to accept children and the woman's two children were placed in temporary foster care while she stayed at the shelter. The separation from her children proved unbearable for the young mother and soon thereafter she returned home with her little ones in tow. Just one week later, she was brutally shot and murdered by her spouse, as her children witnessed this unspeakable act of violence.

Shortly after this tragedy, the agency's founders were able to purchase the current 54 bed shelter with generous contributions from Dr. Kona and Ruth Simon, and Walter and Peg Griffith. For the first time, WID was able to offer crisis shelter and support to victims of domestic violence and their children, as well as homeless women.

In November 1995, the doors of the Jim & Jan Moran Family Center opened. The Family Center instantly increased WID's visibility, accessibility and capacity to serve more families. Over the years, WID services have evolved and expanded to include counseling, legal aid, job training, a volunteer program and a thrift store. WID also provides continuing education to law enforcement, health care, social service providers and justice system professionals.

In 1999 Janet A. Boyle, established a \$1 million endowment for Women In Distress that will ensure future operations of our organization. Janet's generosity has established a legacy benefiting Women In Distress of Broward County, Inc., its participants and employees for future generations.

As Broward County's only certified domestic violence center, it is incumbent upon all of us to ensure that every woman and child who has the courage to seek help, will be able to receive it. Margaret Mead said, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed it's the only thing that ever has."

# PROGRAMS & SERVICES

Help and support come in many forms. Women In Distress is committed to providing a wide range of services designed to meet the needs of all victims of domestic violence. All services are strictly confidential and privileged information and available free of charge.

## Shelter

Women In Distress has 62 emergency shelter beds in confidential locations for women and their children in need of immediate safety. The goal of the program is to provide safe shelter and supportive services for victims of domestic violence. For many women, leaving home is their first major step in leading a life of safe independence. A professionally trained staff is available 24-hours per day to assist residents with physical and emotional support. Shelter residents receive emergency clothing, food, personal care items, and ongoing individual and group empowerment support including case management, individual/group crisis counseling, community referrals, legal advocacy, emergency financial assistance, and safety planning. The continuum of care is offered through WID's outreach services.

## Outreach Services

A majority of those we serve do not stay in shelter, but instead, use Women In Distress' outreach programs and services. The outreach team delivers a critical lifeline of support beyond the walls of WID's shelter.

The Jim and Jan Moran Family Center is the primary location for outreach services to families that have experienced domestic violence including counseling, service management, advocacy, and children's services. The Jim and Jan Moran Family Center is located on major bus routes providing easy access for participants requiring services.

Counseling services are also provided at satellite offices located in Hallandale Beach, Coconut Creek, Plantation, and the Broward County Courthouse Restraining Order Division. In addition, support/educational groups are offered at the Family Success Center in Pompano Beach, Susan B. Anthony in Pembroke Pines, the Gay and Lesbian Community Center in Ft. Lauderdale, and the Sheriff's North Jail Facility in Pompano Beach. Providing services in these locations allows greater accessibility for all Broward County residents.

## Children's Services

The Children's Program at Women in Distress provides a variety of services at the Jim & Jan Moran Family Center and crisis shelters such as: respite care, parenting groups, support groups as well as individual counseling. The program addresses the particular concerns of children who live in families experiencing domestic violence. Whether or not these children are the targets of physical violence, they may be traumatized by their experiences and observations, which can result in a wide variety of emotional and behavioral problems. In a child-friendly environment, children are provided supportive and educational sessions addressing safety and given the opportunity to discuss their feelings. WID utilizes play therapy, pet therapy, and group and individual educational and recreational activities as techniques to encourage participation.

## 24-hour Crisis Line

The crisis line is staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. It is an invaluable source for information, support, and referrals for victims of domestic violence or those concerned for a friend or family member in an abusive situation. The hotline is also the main referral source for participants to access Women In Distress services. Victims of domestic violence are also provided safety planning. All conversations are confidential. HERE'S HOW WID REACHED OUT TO THE COMMUNITY BETWEEN JULY 1, 2006 AND JUNE 30, 2007

- 58,794 people in the community heard a Women In Distress presentation.
- 1,705 professionals received domestic violence training.
- Thousands of children participated in school based dating and domestic violence education through Get Real About Violence and It's Not Okay.

## SOCIAL CHANGE

In July 2006, Women In Distress inaugurated the Department of Social Change. The department's purpose is to create collaborations throughout Broward County to educate; change perceptions; and advocate for non-violent standards of behavior, so that domestic and dating abuse is unacceptable by anyone, anywhere, at anytime in any way.

The Department provides community, professional, and youth education on domestic violence and prevention. It provides information on domestic violence and its impact on the community to the media, faith, professional and neighborhood organizations, multicultural and multilingual associations, and special needs communities to promote prevention of domestic violence.

### Professional Training

Women In Distress provides professional education about domestic violence to law enforcement personnel as well as to health care professionals. This specialized training includes successful ways to deal with victims and abusers. In addition, the program sheds light on the warning signs of domestic violence.

### Community Education

Trained volunteers and staff are available to conduct education presentations to the community at large. These presentations are delivered at no charge and highlight facts about domestic violence as well as the role of Women In Distress in the community.

### Cut It Out

Women are far more likely to be the victim of an abusive relationship, and many times these women have no one with whom they can talk. Their time with their stylist might be the only time they are alone. Because we know victims might tell their stylists about abuse, we offer free training on domestic violence to salons and stylists.

### School Based Programs

**Hands Are Not For Hitting** is a four-week program for PreK-2nd grade students, designed to provide students the opportunity to examine ways they can use their hands for positive activities rather than for mean or violent acts.

**Get Real About Violence** is a research-based, age-appropriate prevention 8-week curriculum for students in grades K-12. The program targets a wide range of violent behavior, whether it's bullying, teasing, or rumors among younger children or threats and assaults in later years.

**It's Not Okay** is a 5-week program geared for middle and high students. The focus of this program is promoting healthy relationships.

## LONG TERM GOALS

**Goal 1: Increase community awareness to prevent abuse in relationships**

**Goal 2: Empower youth, of all ages, to use conflict avoidance skills and to reject dating violence**

**Goal 3: Recruit men and boys in Broward County to become actively engaged in domestic violence prevention**

**Goal 4: Support the faith communities in prevention of domestic violence**

**Goal 5: Engage neighborhoods in domestic violence prevention, identification, and support activities**

**Goal 6: Foster collaborations to effectuate systemic change to end domestic and dating violence**








## VOLUNTEERS






